Are you familiar with the story of Stone Soup?

A traveler arrives in a small village with an empty pot slung over his back. The traveler goes to a stream and fills the pot with water, and after lighting a fire, places a stone in the pot.

A curious villager ventures out and asks what is he doing? He answers, I am making "Stone Soup," which is scrumptious. The traveler continues saying that he would love to share the delicious soup, but it needs a bit of garnish to improve the flavor.

The villager rushes home to grab a few carrots to add to the pot. Soon other villagers add their donations to the meal. Before long, the smell of potatoes, onions, peas, celery, tomatoes, meat and seasonings fill the air.

Finally, the traveler removes the stone and announces that the "Stone Soup" is ready. The traveler as well as the villagers enjoy a delicious bowl of their combined treasures.

Jeanne Jugan definitely understood the concept of "Stone Soup." By combining a little generosity from many, it would be possible to create a surplus to feed and clothe her elderly poor.

In the book by Paul Milcent, Jeanne Jugan Humble So As To Love More, we find the beginning of her story.

"Towards the end of 1839, possibly in the first cold days of winter, Jeanne said goodbye to her employers the Leroys, where she had been working for a long time, 'I am not leaving you to take another job. I intend to devote myself to charitable work. Every day when I go to the market, I see poor destitute old women.' Monsieur Leroy seems to have then asked how she proposed to

feed them. 'I shall go collecting,' she replied, 'And I shall begin with you. I know you won't refuse me!' And he gave her three hundred francs on the spot."

Jeanne Jugan may not have carried an empty pot and stone, but she did have a basket. With that basket in hand, she would walk for miles every day, asking for leftovers, scraps of cloth and bits of wood to provide for the elderly poor in her care.

Collecting or begging was the means by which Jeanne Jugan and

her "daughters in community" fed, clothed and housed thousands of elderly poor all over Europe and beyond.

Jeanne was often treated poorly when she would arrive with her basket in hand; but she was relentless in her quest. On one particular visit she was struck

> in the face in response to her request. Her response was "Thank you; that was for me. Now please give me something for my poor!"

Jeanne was always grateful for any gift she was given, no matter the size. When she was treated poorly, she never spoke a negative word about the person. "For you see, she would say, when we are given a hostile reception, this is good for us and something we can offer to God."

Today, the Little Sisters of the Poor continue the traditions of their foundress St. Jeanne Jugan, providing and caring for the elderly poor. The tradition of

begging/collecting remains a humble exchange and is only fruitful with the generosity of YOU, our benefactors, the greater community and our local merchants who open their hearts when a Little Sister comes collecting.

The tradition of collecting has changed from a basket to a begging van, but the need, care, love and support has remained the same. Every day in Homes all over the world, in 31 countries, the Little Sisters of the Poor are still making "Stone Soup."
