"I shall begin with you"

In 1839, St. Jeanne Jugan went to her long-time employer and said, "I am not leaving you to take another job. I intend to devote myself to charitable work. Every day when I go to the market, I see poor destitute old women." When he asked how she intended to provide for them she replied, "I shall go collecting, and I shall begin with you. I know you won't refuse me!" He gave her three hundred francs and the ministry of the Little Sisters of the Poor was born.

St. Joseph's Home is the product of many who said "yes" to the Little Sisters when they came begging for their precious elderly. Today, after nearly 25 years at their current location, the Little Sisters are coming to you to ask for your help in caring



for the elderly poor of this community. St. Joseph's Home currently has two (2) whirlpool tubs in need of replacement, each are 24 years old, used for the 50 Residents in the nursing home. The current models have a lift that raises the Resident over four feet into the air before lowering them into the tub. The newer models have doors that allow for less stressful means of entering the bathing and therapeutic tubs.
